About CERT...

CERT training promotes a partnering effort between emergency services and the people that they serve. The goal is for emergency personnel to train members of neighborhoods, community organizations, or workplaces in basic response skills. **CERT** members are then integrated into the emergency response capability for their area.

CERT members can assist the public by applying the basic response and organizational skills that they learned during training. These skills can help save and sustain lives following a disaster until help arrives. **CERT** skills also apply to daily emergencies.

CERT members maintain and refine their skills by participating in exercises and activities. They can attend supplemental training opportunities offered by the sponsoring agency and others that further their skills base. Finally, **CERT** members can volunteer for projects that improve community emergency preparedness.

CERT Training

1. Describe the types of hazards most likely to affect their homes and communities.
2. Take steps to prepare themselves for a disaster.
3. Identify and reduce potential fire hazards in their homes and workplaces.
4. Work as a team to apply basic fire suppression strategies, resources, and safety measures to extinguish a burning liquid.
5. Apply techniques for opening airways, controlling bleeding, and treating shock.
6. Conduct triage under simulated conditions.
7. Perform head-to-toe assessments.
8. Select and set up a treatment area.
9. Employ basic treatments for various wounds.
10. Describe the most common techniques for searching a structure.
11. Use safe techniques for debris removal and victim extrication.
